Overview

Massachusetts Institute of Technology ranks 82 out of 257 schools in the 2026 College Free Speech Rankings with a score of 60 and a D- speech climate grade.

Student perceptions place MIT in the top 25 for “Self-Censorship” and in the top 50 for “Openness” to discussing controversial issues. But it ranks in the bottom 50 for “Comfort Expressing Ideas” and in the bottom 25 for perceived “Administrative Support,” underscoring a campus where more students are open to having conversations. Though comparatively more students feel uncomfortable and believe that the administration would not support them if a controversy broke out.

MIT could strengthen its speech climate by revising its written speech policies to earn a “green light” Spotlight rating and by adopting an official commitment to institutional neutrality.

FIRE’s Spotlight database annually rates regulations on student expression based on the extent to which they restrict free speech.

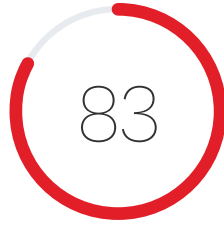
