## Overview

Dartmouth College ranks 35 out of 257 schools in the 2026 College Free Speech Rankings with a score of 68 and is the top-ranked Ivy League school. The college vaulted 189 places after undergoing a major policy revamp to earn a “green light” Spotlight rating and formally adopted institutional neutrality, improvements that outweighed penalties for two speech controversies last year.

Student perceptions place Dartmouth in the top 25 for “Political Tolerance” and in the top 50 on “Disruptive Conduct,” showing comparatively stronger support for letting controversial speakers on campus and little appetite for shout-downs. At the same time, the school ranks in the bottom 50 for “Comfort Expressing Ideas,” indicating many students hold back in classroom and campus discussions.

Dartmouth has laid the groundwork by amending restrictive policies, but positive cultural change takes time. The university could build on recent gains by adopting the Chicago Statement and continuing to invest in programming that encourages respectful, open debate across contentious issues.
