Overview

Massachusetts Institute of Technology ranks 86 out of 261 schools in the 2027 College Free Speech Rankings with a score of 63 and a D speech climate grade.

MIT ranks in the top 25 for “Self-Censorship” and in the top 50 for “Openness,” meaning students hesitate less to speak and fewer contentious topics feel off-limits. Its “Disruptive Conduct” rank jumped 121 places from last year, showing less student acceptance of non-peaceful forms of protest.

MIT’s Faculty Senate affirmed the pro-free speech Chicago Statement, but the campus retains a “yellow light” Spotlight rating. MIT should revise student codes to earn a “green light” Spotlight rating and adopt institutional neutrality. It should respond clearly and forcefully to defend free speech whenever censorship occurs or is demanded. Doing so will demonstrate MIT’s commitment to free speech and build community trust that the administration will defend expressive rights.
